

THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB RULES

1. The name of the Club shall be 'THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB'.

OBJECTS

- 2. The objects of the Club shall be:-
- to promote social and sporting activities amongst civil engineers and their families.
- (ii) to give retired Members of the Institution the opportunity for maintaining friendships established during their professional life
- (iii) to enhance the image of the Civil Engineer through the organization of major events.

ADMISSION AND ELECTION OF MEMBERS

- 3. All grades of Members of the Institution of Civil Engineers and staff shall be eligible as Members of the Club and such other persons of like professional interests whom the Committee may deem suitable. The Committee may invite other suitable persons to be Honorary members without payment of a Subscription.
- 4. All candidates for election shall complete an appropriate application form which shall be submitted to the Secretary. The election of members shall be at the discretion of the Committee.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

- 5. The annual subscription shall be fixed by the Committee and shall be payable on 1 January each year. The annual subscription of Members who are members of the Institution may be paid with their subscription to the Institution.
- 6. Any Member whose annual subscription is 2 years in arrears

shall cease to be a Member of the Club.

OFFICE BEARERS

- 7. The Office Bearers of the Club shall be:-
- Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer.
- 8. The Officers of the Club shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Club. The Chairman shall not hold office for more than 3 years.

THE COMMITTEE

- 9. The Committee which shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Club shall consist of the Officers of the Club and a representative of each section established by the Committee to promote an interest of Members or to organize social events and visits in a particular area. In addition there may be up to 6 Ordinary Members, (two of whom shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for reelection until the lapse of 12 months).
- 10. The Director Institution Affairs of the Institution and the Institution Editor of the NCE shall be 3 Members of the Committee ex officio.
- 11. The Committee shall have the management of all matters connected with the Club and shall have the power to co-opt and appoint sub Committees. The Chairman shall be entitled to a casting of vote.
- 12. The Committee may fill any casual vacancy amongst the elected members by co-option: the person appointed shall hold office for a period not exceeding the period of office of the Committee Member he replaces.
- 13. Five members of the Committee shall form a quorum at any meeting.

MEETINGS

- 14. There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Club in January of each year, notice of which shall be published in the New Civil Engineer. The Chairman shall when present take the Chair at the Annual General Meeting at which the Committee shall submit a report, together with duly audited accounts. No proxies shall be allowed.
- 15. Special Meetings may be called by Circular to all Members by the Committee or on a requisition signed by 10 or more members on notice of 30 days. Such notice shall specify the Business to be bought before the meeting and no business except that which is notified shall be transacted at such meeting. No proxies shall be allowed at any special meeting of the Club.

ALTERATION OF RULES

16. No addition or alteration to the Rules of the Club shall be made except at an Annual General Meeting or a Special Meeting and not unless Notice of Motion shall have been published in the New Civil Engineer.

TRUSTEES

- 17. The Institution of Civil Engineers, acting through its Council, shall be Trustees of the Club in whom shall be vested all the property of the Club.
- 18. The Trustees shall out of the property of the Club, be indemnified against all labilities but subject to this right of indemnity, the property of the Club shall be controlled by the Committee who shall decide all investment of funds and the sale and transfer of securities.

Report on The Thomas Telford Trophy Golf Tournament held on 10th September 1992 The Royal Porthcawl Golf Club, South Wales

Introduction

The South Wales Association were successful in winning the Thomas Telford Trophy at Royal Portrush Golf Club in 1991 and immediately agreed to host the tournament in 1992.

Maintaining the tradition of the event that a Championship Course be selected to play for the trophy, it was decided within the South Wales Association Golf Society that the Royal Porthcawl Golf Course, with its prestigious rating of being in the "top twenty" of British Golf Courses, should be chosen and a reservation was made for 10th September 1992.

South Wales Association Organisation for the Event

The four successful S.W.A. team members at the Royal Portrush event in 1991, Tony Parker, Simon Howell, Adonis Kalogeras the Idris Thomas were elected as a Sub-committee of the local Association in accordance with the Branch's constitution and were delegated powers to make all arrangements for the event, including sponsorship. Financial transactions relating to income and expenditure being handled through the local Association's Treasurer.

The Sub-committee issued the following objectives:-

- 1. That everyone participating or associated with the tournament would enjoy themselves and the occasion would principally be a social event in line with the objectives of the Civil Engineers Club.
- 2. That the event through sponsorship and entry fees would be self supporting and that the local Association would not be called upon to fund any aspect of the event.

Funding

The principal financial support was provided by Thomas Telford Press and David Lewis, Civil Eng., but several local firms of Consultants and Contractors, provided generous donations. Golf World Magazine provided 3 balls for each competitor together with a copy of their September issue and a box of golf 'trinkets'.

The Event

The Coed-y-Mwstwr Hotel, near Bridgend, adjacent the M4 motorway, was the base for the event and the programmed items of:-

1. Registration and Social Evening on the evening of 9th September.

2. The presentation dinner on the evening of the 10th September, were held successfully at the banqueting suite.

The Thomas Telford Trophy

All 16 Associations of the Institution of the Civil Engineers together with a team representing The Thomas Telford Press and Great George Street Staff participated in the competition which took the form of a Foursomes Stableford in the morning and individual Stableford in the afternoon.

The winners were Edinburgh and East Scotland team with the highest aggregate score for the day of 164 points. The full results were as per the attached schedules together with a list of representatives for each association.

An invitation was sent to The Institution of Engineers for Eire but unfortunately they were unable to attend and their place was taken by the successful team at Royal Portrush 1991, all of whom had failed to qualify for the 1992 South Wales team.

Celebration Dinner

The Hosts were honoured with the presence of Mr. Stuart Mustow, Vice-President of the Institution and Chairman of Civil Engineers Club, who presented the prizes.

Mr. Harry O'Hanlon, captain of the winning team, Edinburgh and East Scotland, in his victory speech thanked the organisers and praised the staff of the Royal Porthcawl G.C. for the excellent condition of the course and undertook to host the event in 1994.

Mr. Howard Barrett, captain of the London Association, reported that his association has accepted the offer to host the evening in 1993 and it would take place at Betchworth Park, Dorking, on the 2nd September 1993.

The event was brought to a close by event chairman, Mr. David Thomas, Chairman of the South Wales Association, thanking his subcommittee, the management of Coed-y-Mwstwr, the Royal Porthcawl G.C. and sponsors for all their efforts in making the event a success.





Membership

The greatest success has probably been the growth in Club numbers since Mr. Robin Wilson's initiative of three years ago. At that time there were only three members in the Province and according to the latest listing this figure now stands at forty. The activities of the 'Seniors' have made the greatest contribution to the increase and there are signs that this is going to continue.

Sailing

The Irish Sea 'meet' of boats from Northern Ireland, North West, Wales and Scotland took place on the Clyde this year on the week-end of 20th June with the vessels converging (or nearly converging) on the Royal Gourock Yacht Club. This was the venue for a very grand black tie dinner with pre-dinner drinks on "Ocean Phoenix" in Inverkip Marina.

SAILING

Report by John Witchell About our Mariners

Channel Fleet

After an encouraging start to the season the weather sadly deteriorated after the end of July, earlier for some; not only has there been rain much needed but why when we want to sail - but also strong winds up to gale force have kept us, me at least, in harbour. Nevertheless, we have been able to hold and enjoy our programme with increased attendance at most events. We were particularly pleased to welcome several first timers, and the return of old friends.

As usual our season started at the end of April (too early for a few) at Bembridge I.O.W; nine boats' including two from the Royal Engineer Y.C. skippered by John Bennett and Russ Wilson, made it to Brading Haven marina in time for pre-dinner drinks on Samiotissa and Amity. Fortunately before the bottles were quite empty it was time to adjourn to the most hospitable local yacht club for a dinner which was eaten with gusto and much hilarity. Speeches were mercifully short. The Club boats and their crews attending were Caledonia, skippered by Chris Bosker; Niobi, Stephen Evans and Richard Ireland; Palu, Trevor Crocker; Sea Bird, Kieren Coyne; Samiotissa, Ken Scott; Sympatico, Simon Crofts and Amity, John Witchell. The weather on the Saturday was fine with a gentle S to SW breeze but during the night a strong west wind arose with rain and on Sunday morning Simon Crofts, bound to Lymington, and Ken Scott, bound to Beaulieu had not only a 6.30 am breakfastless start to catch the tide but also a very wet experience. It is reported by a usually reliable source that Ken and his crew sat down at 11.30 to two eggs, six rashers of bacon and four sausages each.

The visit to St. Vaast over the late Spring Bank holiday was as enjoyable as ever; during the Saturday and Sunday crews did their own thing and those arriving early enough to visit the local street market found much to tempt them. Visits were also made to Monsieur Goselin to stock up with wine. The rally dinner, an essential part of our rallies, was held on the Sunday night at the Restaurant des Fuschias: This started with a 'Kir Royale' the garden. The rally was attended by John Witchell in Amity, Simon Crofts in Simpatico, Hubert Jenkins in Novak and by Elisabeth Lamont - a temporary civil engineer for the weekend. We are always pleased if a few friends join us so if any of your friends would like to come to our rallies in their boats they will be welcome.

June 2nd saw the departure from Beaulieu of Ken Scott and John Bartlett in Samiotissa bound for the Western Isles of Scotland. After much 'pressing on' Samiotissa passed through the Crinan Canal to Crinan on the 12th. Ken, who with John had had to leave the boat at Holyhead (where I joined), rejoined at Crinan on the 19th June with Betty and Tricia. There followed a most wonderful cruise round the islands of Mull and Skye. Samiotissa having rounded Ardermurchan Point was able to wear a sprig of heather on her pulpit which she did with pride. Our cruise ended at Craobh Marina, pronounced Crouve, on the 6th July, where we succumbed to the delights of the shore. Leaving Samiotissa at Craobh to be picked up by John Bartlett (of which more later), we returned home - just in time to start for the Channel Islands. Features of the cruise were the magnificent scenery, the friendly welcome we got everywhere we went, the scarcity of other yachts (sometimes we might see only one or two on passage and anchor alone) and the temperature. Meanwhile in the sunny south 14 civil engineer boats were taking part in the Round the Island Race for the Smeaton Trophy. This race was a frustrating experience and a great disappointment for all the entrants, as due to lack of wind none of the fourteen managed to complete the shortened course in the time allowed. In this they were in the great majority as under 15% of the entrants finished. Accordingly the Smeaton Trophy could not be awarded.
