
LETTER FROM OUR CHAIRMAN

THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB RULES

 The name of the Club shall be "THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB".

OBJECTS

- 2. The objects of the Club shall be:-
- to promote social and sporting activities amongst civil engineers and their families.
- to give retired Members of the Institution the opportunity for maintaining friendships established during their professional life.
- (iii) to enhance the image of the Civil Engineer through the organization of major events.

ADMISSION AND ELECTION OF MEMBERS

- 3. All grades of Members of the Institution of Civil Engineers and staff shall be eligible as Members of the Club and such other persons of like professional interests whom the Committee may deem suitable. The Committee may invite other suitable persons to be Honourary members without payment of a Subscription.
- All candidates for election shall complete an appropriate application form which shall be submitted to the Secretary. The election of members shall be at the discretion of the Committee.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

- The annual subscription shall be fixed by the Committee and shall be payable on I January each year. The annual subscription of Members who are members of the Institution may be paid with their subscription to the Institution.
- Any Member whose annual subscription is 2 years in arrears shall cease to be a Member of the Club.

OFFICE BEARERS

- 7. The Office Bearers of the Club shall be:-Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer.
- The Officers of the Club shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Club. The Chairman shall not hold office for more than 3 years.

THE COMMITTEE

- 9. The Committee which shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Club shall consist of the Officers of the Club and a representative of each section established by the Committee to promote an interest of Members or to organize social events and visits in a particular area. In addition there may be up to 6 Ordinary Members, (two of whom shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for re-election until the lapse of 12 months).
- 10. The Institution's Director (Local Associations and External Affairs) and the ICE News Reporter for New Civil Engineer shall each be ex-officio Members of the Committee.
- 11. The Committee shall have the management of all matters connected with the Club and shall have the power to co-opt and appoint sub Committees. The Chairman shall be entitled to a casting of vote.
- 12. The Committee may fill any casual vacancy amongst the elected members by co-option: the person appointed shall hold office for a period not exceeding the period of office of the Committee Member he replaces.
- Five members of the Committee shall form a quorum at any meeting.

- 14. There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Club to be held immediately following the 1st Council Meeting of the Institution in the calendar year or such other date as the committee decide. The Chairman shall, when present, take the Chair at which the committee shall submit a report together with duly audited accounts. No proxies shall be allowed.
- 15. Special Meetings may be called by Circular to all Members by the Committee or on a requisition signed by 10 or more members on notice of 30 days. Such notice shall specify the Business to be bought before the meeting and no business except that which is notified shall be transacted at such meeting. No proxies shall be allowed at any special meeting of the Club.

ALTERATION OF RULES

16. No changes or additions to the rules of the Club shall be made except at an Annual General Meeting or a Special Meeting and not unless each member is posted a Notice of Motion or the Notice of Motion will have been published in NCE.

TRUSTEES

- 17. The Institution of Civil Engineers, acting through its Council, shall be Trustees of the Club in whom shall be vested all the property of the Club.
- 18. The Trustees shall out of the property of the Club, be indemnified against all liabilities but subject to this right of indemnity, the property of the Club shall be controlled by the Committee who shall decide all investment of funds and the sale and transfer of securities.

*Gareth Gardner. Co-opted Member is our representative on the New Civil Engineer. He is the I.C.E. news reporter.




For the second year we have had a wonderfully warm summer and hopefully we have all been able to make good use of it. Certainly our Club events have been well attended; indeed we mustered 7 boats for the Channel Islands cruise, which will take some beating this year.

The season started with a rally to the Folly Inn up the river Medina attended by 9 boats, including for the first time, Martin Hadley's new boat Mary Lou, a Norfolk Gypsy, and Lady Cat a 39' Prout catamaran sailed by Colin Smith, a newcomer to our rallies, and Gerald Davies. We were very pleased to welcome again Valerie Leggatt, one of the original CEC sailors, who came with Alec in Capriol, and Bob Freer, a new member sailing with Simon Crofts in Sympatica. The late Spring rally to St Vaast was for the second year not held as there was insufficient support for the trip. It is hoped we can muster enough boats this year. Tim Grithith and Ron Marsh in Outrageous had individual cruises across channel over the weekend. In June there were more entries than ever for the Smeaton and Telford Goblet and even bigger entries are expected this year.

Smeaton Trophy and Telford Goblet

Both trophies are competed for by members and members of staff of the Institution of Civil Engineers sailing in the Island Sailing Club's Round the Island Race. The Smeaton Trophy, awarded to the member who's boat had the lowest quotient determined by dividing its finishing position in its class by the number of starters in that class, was won by David Fawcett sailing J Toad, a Warsash One Design, in the class for non-rated cruising yachts; Peter Noble was second in Sunsail Hotel and Richard Bastow third in Ivory Moon. There were 13 entries. The Telford Goblet, awarded to the member who's boat was the highest placed the Channel handicap Class was won by Michael Fox sailing Matchmaker II with Patrick Marshall in Freya second and W Duckett in Gallivanter II third. The 1996 Round the Island Race will be on 29th June.

Roy and June Peel completed their cruise to the Mediterranean and back; in the Autumn of 1994 they had laid up Idle Jack at St Jean de Losne on the Saone and this year they brought her back to the Channel by way of the "Canal du Centre", "the Canal Lateral at la Loire" and the "Seine" in time to join us in St Helier in July.

David and Sepha Wood had also left Tehari II abroad and collected her from Marieheim, that historic last home of the great sailing ships, where they had laid her up following their visit to St Petersberg in 1994. In 1995 they completed their epic cruise and after a brief sail in the Aarland Islands they brought Tehari II home via the Baltic States, Poland, East 7 West Germany, the Kiel Canal, Ijsselmere, Amsterdam and the Dutch canals. In Amsterdam they were in time to see the finish of the Tall Ships Race. Well done both boats and their crews.

Chris Bosker with Caledonia paid a visit to the West Country. They hoped to be able to meet some of the local engineers for a chat and a jar but their invitation was not accepted. Pity! To digress it would I'm sure be enjoyable for all concerned if engineer yachtsmen sailing in the Thames Estuary and West Country could emulate their Northwestern/Scottish and Irish colleagues and have an annual get together. What about it?

In Amity we did not stray far. We tried to make Burnham in Essex but only got as far as Ramsgate; we attempted the crossing of the Estuary but a northwesterly force 4 and drizzle indicated a return to base. Amity consoled herself with a fleeting visit to Calais (not one of my favourite ports) before returning to Gosport via Eastbourne (well worth a visit) and Brighton.

I am sure many other members had interesting cruises so this year please let me have information of your cruises so that my future annual reports can be more interesting.

WORKS VISITS - 1995

Three visits were organised to works of interest during 1995, the first to the Didcot Railway Centre, the second to the Welsh Highland Railway Restoration Project, and the third to the Basingstoke Canal Restoration Project.

Visit to the Didcot Railway Centre - 2 July 1995

The party assembled at the Refreshment Room at the Centre at 14.30 hours.

We all then set off on an inspection of the workshops where a number of interesting projects were in progress. Of particular interest was the building of a replica of "Firefly", one of the first batch of broad gauge single wheelers built to the design of Daniel Gooch, Brunel's Chief Mechanical Engineer. Other locomotives under restoration included a King class loco and also a Saint 4.6.0.

As the date was a "steam day", it was then possible to take a short ride on a steam hauled Great Western branch line train, hauled by a tank engine.


The weather had not been too kind, dull with showers, but since most of the time was spent under cover, this did not put too much of a damper on the proceedings.

Visit to the Welsh Highland Railway - 13 August 1996

Sunday, 13 August dawned bright and fair, the rain which had fallen the day before having washed the air clear.

As we drove into Portmadoc to the rendezvous for the visit, the Welsh mountains of the Snowdon Range stood out sharply chiselled against a blue sky.

Our group, coming from far and near, assembled at the station restaurant from 10.30 onwards. After a quick cup of coffee, the 11.00 hours train was boarded and right on time the train drew out of the station, headed by the steam locomotive "Gelert". The line runs for only one mile towards Beddgelert across the river plain (traeth in Welsh!). Alas the end of the line was soon reached, all that remains of over 20




Some of the party

miles of track joining Portmadoc with Caernavon. This narrow gauge (2.0 ft) line closed down some sixty years ago, but an ambitious scheme has been launched to reconstruct the line, linking up with the Ffestiniog Railway, and creating a narrow gauge line some 40 miles long, connecting Caernarvon with Blaunau Ffestiniog.

An excellent lunch was then consumed in the station restaurant. The party set out afterwards in motor convoy to follow the route of the line from Portmadoc to Pont Croesor. Snowdon lay right ahead, looking impressive among the other 3,000 ft high peaks. A stop was made at Pont Croesor, where the railway crossed the Glaslyn river. The party moved on to pick up the route of the line at Nantmor and then on through the Glaslyn Pass to Beddgelert. The line was then followed to Caernarvon but we failed to locate the old terminus at Dinas. A splinter group next day found the right place, now a civil engineering contractor's yard!

The return journey was over the hills to Cwm, providing a magnificent view of Anglesey and the Menai Straits. Descent towards the village of Cwm led to a confrontation with the Law in the shape of an amicable Welsh policeman who was going the other way in the narrow lane. We were able to pass after suitable pleasantries so all was well.

On the return journey, a stop was made in the Glaslyn Pass to walk along the trackbed through the tunnels. Finally those of the party who had survived to that stage, were rewarded with an "excellent tea" - quoting those who were there, at the "Inn of the Sixth Happiness" (used on the firm of Gladys Aylward's life) at Nantmor.

All who took part considered the day had been most enjoyable and memorable, blessed as it was by virtually unbroken sunshine all day.

Visit to the Basingstoke Canal Restoration Project - 10 September 1995

In contrast to the North Wales visit, we did not have the best of weather for this visit! Steady light rain was falling as the party assembled at the refreshment room on the site at the Canal Museum at 2 pm.

After some light refreshment, an inspection of the Canal Museum followed. This proved both interesting and instructive.

To view the new aqueduct, it would have been necessary to walk about 2 miles in the rain along the towpath. In spite of a keen desire by all present to undertake the walk, it was decided on mature reflection to take a trip on a motorised barge along the canal halfway to the aqueduct and then to continue on foot. This was in theory, in practice all decided to stay aboard the barge and to return to base!


In conclusion, members of the party were much impressed with the work done in restoring the canal and wished the project every success in the future.




Golf - Thomas Telford Trophy Golf Tournament
