

THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB • RULES •

1. The name of the Club shall be 'THE CIVIL ENGINEERS' CLUB'.

OBJECTS

- 2. The objects of the Club shall be:-
- to promote social and sporting activities amongst civil engineers and their families.
- (ii) to give retired Members of the Institution the opportunity for maintaining friendships established during their professional life
- (iii) to enhance the image of the Civil Engineer through the organization of major events.

ADMISSION AND ELECTION OF MEMBERS

- 3. All grades of Members of the Institution of Civil Engineers and staff shall be eligible as Members of the Club and such other persons of like professional interests whom the Committee may deem suitable. The Committee may invite other suitable persons to be Honorary members without payment of a Subscription.
- 4. All candidates for election shall complete an appropriate application form which shall be submitted to the Secretary. The election of members shall be at the discretion of the Committee.

SUBSCRIPTIONS

- 5. The annual subscription shall be fixed by the Committee and shall be payable on 1 January each year. The annual subscription of Members who are members of the Institution may be paid with their subscription to the Institution.
- 6. Any Member whose annual subscription is 2 years in arrears

shall cease to be a Member of the Club.

OFFICE BEARERS

7. The Office Bearers of the Club shall be:-Chairman, Vice Chairman,

Secretary, Treasurer.

8. The Officers of the Club shall be elected annually at the Annual General Meeting of the Club. The Chairman shall not hold

office for more than 3 years. THE COMMITTEE

- 9. The Committee which shall be elected at the Annual General Meeting of the Club shall consist of the Officers of the Club and a represen-tative of each section established by the Com-mittee to promote an interest of Members or to organize social events and visits in a particular area. In addition there may be up to 6 Ordinary Members, (two of whom shall retire annually and shall not be eligible for reelection until the lapse of 12 months).
- 10. The Director Institution Affairs of the Institution and the Institution Editor of the NCE shall be 3 Members of the Committee ex officio.
- 11. The Committee shall have the management of all matters connected with the Club and shall have the power to co-opt and appoint sub Committees. The Chairman shall be entitled to a casting of vote.
- 12. The Committee may fill any casual vacancy amongst the elected members by co-option: the person appointed shall hold office for a period not exceeding the period of office of the Committee Member he replaces.
- 13. Five members of the Committee shall form a quorum at any meeting.

MEETINGS

- 14. There shall be an Annual General Meeting of the Club in January of each year, notice of which shall be published in the New Civil Engineer. The Chairman shall when present take the Chair at the Annual General Meeting at which the Committee shall submit a report, together with duly audited accounts. No proxies shall be allowed.
- 15. Special Meetings may be called by Circular to all Members by the Committee or on a requisition signed by 10 or more members on notice of 30 days. Such notice shall specify the Business to be bought before the meeting and no business except that which is notified shall be transacted at such meeting. No proxies shall be allowed at any special meeting of the Club.

ALTERATION OF RULES

16. No addition or alteration to the Rules of the Club shall be made except at an Annual General Meeting or a Special Meeting and not unless Notice of Motion shall have been published in the New Civil Engineer.

TRUSTEES

- 17. The Institution of Civil Engineers, acting through its Council, shall be Trustees of the Club in whom shall be vested all the property of the Club.
- 18. The Trustees shall out of the property of the Club, be indemnified against all liabilities but subject to this right of indemnity, the property of the Club shall be controlled by the Committee who shall decide all investment of funds and the sale and transfer of securities.

SENIORS SECTION GUIDELINES

- 1. Seniors Section of the Club provide for the Club members who are retired or approaching retirement who wish to make greater use of their ability to attend day-time meetings and occasions and members' spouses are welcome on an equal basis.
- 2. A Seniors programme of events is arranged annually within each Local Association area. The activities of each Seniors Section are coordinated by a local Committee comprising a Chairman and a number of District Representatives. The Chairman is ex officio, a member of the Club Committee and is responsible for all local arrangements and liaison with the Local Association.
- 3. Members pay an annual subscription to the Club (currently £6.00 per annum) and their share of the cost of each function they attend: there is no 'local' subscription. The Club will make an annual grant to each Seniors Section to cover its general running costs not recovered in the charge it makes to members for each function.
- 4. The Seniors programme of events is published in the Club Newsletter sent to all members in March and October together with reports of events which have taken place.
- 5. There is no age limit to be on the mailing list for Seniors Section activities: any member of the Club may attend a function. Indeed any member of the Institution will be welcome in the anticipation that he or she might become a Club Member.



Held on Thursday 29th November 1990 at the Young Chelsea Bridge Club.







The early spring rally to Bembridge I.O.W. over the weekend 28th/29th April was attended by Samiotissa (Ken Scott), Idle Jack (Roy Peel), Niobi (Steven Evans and Richard Ireland), Manumit (Chris Bosker), Dulcia (Gerald Davies) and Amity (John Witchell). We were pleased to welcome Ruth Brown one of the younger members of the Club who was crewing in Idle Jack. Roy inspired by Ruth or his daughter, probably both, sported a striking shirt of red and yellow flowers. We were to be dazzled by this on subsequent occasions and although I tried to compete with my parrots shirt it was no contest. In the evening there were drinks on Amity before adjourning to the Brading Haven Yacht Club for dinner.

We were very pleased this year to renew our association with the Royal Engineer Yacht Club with a joint rally to Ouistreham in the Baie

The lunch to celebrate the rally was held on the Sunday at the Restaurant La Broche d'Argent following which those boats who had to be back for Tuesday morning departed. Those lucky enough to be able to stay a while took a bus to Caen where we found Buenavela (Ken and Millie Odell) in the marina keeping the Club banner flying. Engraved glasses were given to the vessels reaching Ouistreham and to Novak for a good try. The return passages were uneventful except for Ken Scott and his crew. Samiotissa got a cargo net around her propeller crossing the

The Channel Islands Cruise was, as it always has been, a most enjoyable week. The crossing to Cherbourg on the Saturday in the case of Amity, was rough but fast. We arrived in time for the 14th July fireworks, moving on to Alderney on Sunday evening and to Guernsey on the Monday, where we met up with Novak and Idle Jack. We were welcomed by Walter Prow who gave us details of the following days entertainment, consisting in the morning, of a visit to the Site of their new offices for which the foundations were under construction, followed by a talk, coffee and visit to the bar at the Guernsey Yacht Club. The last of the Club rallies was the Autumn rally held over the




Harvest Barn, Jersey





The Midlands Association successfully defended its title as the Civil Engineers' Club Golf Champions when its team retained the Thomas Telford Trophy on home ground at Walsall Golf Club in September.

Fifteen teams of four representing the Regional Associations together with a team from Thomas Telford Limited completed for the coveted trophy over the 6,243 yards parkland course situated in the heart of the West Midlands. The format for the event followed the successful pattern adopted in previous years with morning foursomes followed by afternoon singles, all having individual prizes. The highest aggregate Stableford score of both the foursomes and the four singles matches determined the trophy winners.

As dawn broke on the morning of the event, heavy overnight rain gave way to a bright clear sky and blustery wind and this set the pattern for the remainder of the day. Many of the competitors had only a short drive to the course having availed themselves of the accommodation provided at the nearby Polytechnic Halls of Residence. Registration and coffee was followed by a team photo call in front of the Clubhouse (the photographs were later inserted into the dinner menus) before competitors strode purposefully towards their allotted starting tees.

Throughout the day the overall standard of play was credibly high which was no doubt helped by the excellent lunchtime buffet and the obligatory refreshment tent strategically placed between the 9th and 18th greens.

ICE President, Professor Peter Stott, Past President, Sir William Francis, Lady Francis and Civil Engineers' Club Chairman, Robin Wilson were guests at the presentation dinner held in the Clubhouse and all were warmly welcomed by the Chairman of the Midlands Association, Keith Seago. 
