Civil Engineers' Club: Annual report for 2024 Chairs' Report 2024

Last year my report focused on broadening the activities of the club so that we could better cater for those who live beyond London, the South of England and Northern Ireland. We set out to be better connected with the ICE regions and I am pleased to say that we have made good progress towards this during the year. I am grateful for the support of Wendy Blundell, ICE's Director of Regions, in helping to achieve this and I am pleased to report that we now have new committee members from Wales, Scotland and the Midlands. This gives us a sound foothold in the Regions from which we can build new activities.

We also set out a new and more modern Constitution to support a gentle change of direction in the Club. This focusses more on our role in supporting the broader body of civil engineers in the UK, and in improving their well-being. It is also clearer about the roles and responsibilities of members and the Committee. It helped to uncover an anomaly in the operation of the CEC. It had been assumed that the Club was always part of the ICE, but a meeting with the ICE Directors revealed that, like the other Associated Societies, the CEC is only affiliated to the ICE. It is a separate legal entity. Whereas it benefits from support from the ICE through its Level of Service Agreement, it does not benefit, for example, from the protection of ICE's insurance policy. It has taken a considerable amount of work and some cost to set in place an appropriate policy to cover the potential third party liability of Club and Committee members arising from our activities. This covers loss arising from negligence of the club in delivering our activities. It is important to note that it does not extend to covering any personal liability from anyone taking part in those activities. The range of activities and geographical extent are also limited, so for example, we can no longer arrange any off shore sailing or activities outside of the UK.

Traditionally we have always arranged a lecture in association with the AGM, but last year we departed from this and held a Question Time Debate. This proved to be a great success and is being organised this year as a joint event between the CEC and the ICE. I am grateful to ICE Directors Sean Harris and Chris Richards, and to the ICE events team for their support of the CEC throughout the year.

I would, as always, also like to thank the unstinted support from the Committee and other members in helping to organise our events and ensure the smooth running of the club. Much of the day to day work falls, of course, on the shoulders of our Secretary and Treasurer, and I am pleased to report that all the formal running of the club has proceeded this year largely without a hitch, including the reshaping of our financial reporting to improve the clarity of the financing of individual events.

I am leaving the detailed reporting of our activities to our Secretary and other members of the Committee. And whilst I would like to finish on a positive note, I must share something that is a concern to me. None of us on the Committee are getting any younger, and whilst there is no shortage of enthusiasm or energy in delivering and developing our programme of activities, we have to face the reality that we need to be serious about succession planning. Even my own role, which is due to finish this year, is proving difficult to fill. We all lead busy lives but may I ask if there is anyone who thinks they might be able to give support to the work of the Committee to please come forward, and help to sustain the club into the future.

Golf: Thomas Telford Trophy 2023 The Wales National, Hensol, Vale of Glamorgan

The 37th Thomas Telford Trophy national team golf competition was hosted by the ICE Wales Cymru (South) Branch at the stunning Wales National Course in the Vale of Glamorgan Monday 4th September 2023. The Civil Engineers' Club is grateful to the organising team for making the arrangements.

The TTT team competition was first played for in 1986 and is contested by teams of four players invited from the 16 Local Associations of the ICE. The team competition consists of St. Andrews Foursomes play in the morning and singles play in the afternoon with all 6 Stableford scores aggregated to decide the winning team. At this year's event, 12 of the 16 Regions and Branches Associations were represented, coming together to enjoy a weekend of companionship, sporting endeavour, good food and no doubt a drink or two!





The Wales National is a quality, testing course, that is teeming with wildlife across its mature woodland and vast water features. It has hosted an impressive range of professional events for the DP World Tour Challenger and Seniors tours as well as the EuroPro Tour. Designed by renowned golf architect Peter Johnson, it is long - coming in at 7,433 yards off the Championship tees - and in golfing terms is something of a rarity at par 73.

The 2023 event was held in beautiful weather with wall-to-wall sunshine not overly typical of South Wales' weather at that time of year. The scorching

temperatures topped out at 30 degrees and combined with a long, demanding, golf course to make it a challenging day for all!

Despite the perfect golfing weather and outstanding condition of the course, the challenges faced by the players were reflected in the scoring which was considerably lower than recent years.

The morning St Andrews Foursomes was keenly fought with two pairs tied on 38 points before the North West pairing of Richard Mannock & Peter Blair pipped Rob Hayman & Richard Hemming of Southern region on count back. The clear winner of the afternoon singles was Claire Jones from the South West region with a fabulous score of 38 points. Honourable mentions due for the runner up Jake Bartlett (34 points) from the

Wales region and Edward Bill from Northern Ireland who came third on 32 points. Defending champion Stuart Haddow (Glasgow & West of Scotland) repeated his 2022 triumph retaining the Scott Quaich for the best Stableford score playing off a scratch handicap with a score of 30 points.

Special mentions go to Team South West (172 points) and Team Wales (171 points) who ran them very close on a challenging day.

This year saw a strong turnout for the Veterans competition for those who have played in previous Thomas Telford Trophy teams. The 18- hole competition was contested by 8 players from 3 Local Associations with the Chilterns Salver going to Rob Harrhy from Wales with a score of 30 points.

The Tournament Dinner was attended by ICE Wales Cymru (South) Chair, Peter Burns. In his speech Peter spoke of how important the crossregion relationships were within the ICE and how positive it to see such strong bonds created within the institution. He was particularly pleased to be able to show case the South Wales region in such a fine setting and congratulated all players for their skill, endurance, and commitment to representing their regions.

Notes on Walk 28th January 2023

The Astronomical walk started from Paternoster Square at 10.15am. outside the London Stock Exchange building, where we met our guide, Lester Hillman. We saw the 5m long Noon Marker, which casts a shadow the tip of which touches a date marking on the wall at noon when the sun shines. After going towards St Paul's Cathedral, we learned about named craters in space such as the 107km diameter one on Mercury named after the poet John Keats, deep bores in the Antarctic for detecting neutrinos and the association with the Eagle by reference to Neil Armstrong's "the eagle has landed" when setting foot on the moon. We walked to Queen Victoria Street and stopped by the College of Arms where Coats of Arms are registered; and passed the site of Bridewell Palace, the location of Holbein's painting "The Skull." The morning tour finished at St Bride's church in the Strand with Shoe Lane on the opposite side of the road, where the Eagle comic had been published.

We had lunch at Ye Olde London inn on Ludgate Hill.

After lunch we went to Holborn Viaduct (recent 150th anniversary 6th November 2019) and passed Holy Sepulchre church before going by St Bartholomew's with its links to Dick Whittington who died in 1423 and the 900th anniversary event at the church of St Bartholomew the Great is being celebrated this year. We then visited the disused Smithfield Market building which is to be the new site for the London Museum before seeing the gateway at the entrance to the Museum the Order of St John. We then went to Farringdon Station the birthplace of the 160 years old Metropolitan Line (9/10th January 2023) and the new spectacular station on the Elizabeth Line.

The total length of the walk was approximately 3 miles and 22 walkers took part.

Notes on Walk 15th April 2023

The walk started from Reigate BR Station and followed a route on road and paths which were fairly steep in places. We crossed over the A217 by a reinforced concrete bridge, which was the first in the country, and followed the North Downs Way past a Victorian fort, the flying fortress tribute and a WW2 gun emplacement to arrive at Reigate Hill monument where there were some fine views. We descended down a fairly slippery chalk path to the edge of a residential area, leading along roads, tracks and paths to A25 which we crossed in order to make our way along wooded paths to Skimmington castle for lunch.

After lunch we follow tracks and paths to edge of Priory Park. We passed through park to Reigate High Street before returning to Reigate Station via Reigate Castle Tunnel and Castle Mound.

The length of the walk was approximately 8 miles and 12 walkers took part.

CEC Walking Weekend 17-18 June 2023

The annual Walking Weekend was held in Wells-next-the-sea, Norfolk this year and many of the walkers took advantage of the block booking for accommodation and stayed at The Arch House Rooms.

On Friday afternoon we had a visit to the new RNLI station for a guided tour at 1.30pm. The station had been opened earlier this year and Martin Emerson, one of the RNLI team looking after the station and boats, met the group and told us about the station and the equipment. The station has a small inflatable rescue boat which is used for shorter distances and in shallow water, and a new Shannon class rescue boat that replaced the former smaller Mersey class lifeboat. The Shannon class is deployed using a tracked tractor and a tracked cradle, which has a launch and recovery system for the lifeboat. We were able to see the lifeboats from a viewing platform inside the station as well as floor level. We also visited the launch and recovery ramps. Due to the location of the station, and depending on the tide, the deployment can be close to the station or a two mile drive from the station. We had a collection for RLNI station and sent a cheque for £60. The round trip from the quay in Wells was about 2¹/₄ miles.

On Friday evening 26 of us enjoyed an excellent meal at Ollie's Restaurant in the town. On Saturday we met at 9.45am outside the Harbour Master's office for a circular walk that set off along the coast, followed a track alongside woodland and a path through the woods leading to the beach. There were many points of interest and fantastic views along the coastline, including novel flood defences, Holkham Beach, and a nature reserve as well as Holkham Park. We had a break for refreshments in The Outlook just inland from Holkham Beach, and a late lunch in The Courtyard Café at Holkham Hall.

After lunch we took a walk through the grounds of Holkham Hall passing the house, lakes, obelisk and near the Great Barn on our return to Wells. Distance approx. 8 miles. In the evening we met at the Golden Fleece at the quayside for a convivial dinner.

On Sunday there was a choice of taking a bus to Stiffkey for a 5 mile coastal walk back to Wells or going to Walsingham, a beautiful peaceful village with an Abbey and a Shrine both of which are open to the public.

A group of 10 took a ride by the light railway steam train along the narrow-gauge railway from Wells to Walsingham which is bordered by fields with red poppies. Several of us visited the Shrine before returning to Wells along country lanes and paths through fields with a visit to the Carpenters Arms for some well-deserved refreshments. We walked approx. seven miles. A total of 16 people took part in the walks on Sunday.
