

# A wine-tasting with a difference

There was a very good attendance for the wine tasting at Great George Street on 23 October 1985 - it was well justified. Most of us either knew or had heard of Professor Peter Morice but few were aware that apart from his expertise in Civil Engineering, he is a very knowledgeable wine buff in his spare time.

Peter Morice takes a large car when holidaying in France so he can return laden with quantities of carefully chosen bottles. These are brought through customs en masse - yes, through the red channel. Even after paying full duty and tax, he still makes a substantial saving over the retail prices here for similar or the same wines - if you can get them. Of course, you certainly have to know your vintages, vineyards and above all the people you are dealing with, if you want to try it yourself. Judging by results, Peter certainly does.

On this occasion, he gave an expert exploration of the Rhone valley using his own slides to show us the delights of the area; and then allowed us to sample some of the extraordinary range of wines produced on the 125 mile stretch from Vienne to Avignon. (Yes, he called it that - of course, he meant 230 Km).

Our previous essays into the wine tasting field have been given by professional representatives from shippers and wine merchants. This time we had the happy combination of the enthusiasm and knowledge of the amateur wine lover with the expertise of the professional lecturer - a combination that proved irresistable - please come again Peter.

#### Coming events

An informal early evening tasting at Great George Street has been arranged on 25 March, when Angus Thompson will introduce the 'everyday' end of the market. He intends to guide us through the maze of hidden bargains available in the supermarkets and off-licence chains at around the £2 mark (this year's budget permitting). Full details and application forms will be sent to you shortly - the cost will be £2 per head.

The more erudite connoisseurs are promised another 'fine wine' evening in the autumn.

Plans are also being made to visit another one of the rapidly developing English vineyards. This will probably have to be in the South again - they don't grow many wines north of Watford - details will be given in the next newsletter.

# REPORT ON SAILING

Once again our annual visit to Cowes in December was voted by all who took part a great sucess. Our navigational skills were tested to the full as we started off in thick fog blanketing most of the Solent. 'Elvera' over confident in Chichester Harbour (which she knows so well) in spite of Radar and Decca ('superman') nearly finished up on Roman Landing.

'Sunshine Ray' consulted Southampton Weather who predicted fog all day so prudently decided to stay at home. She had lost her mast the year before so Ray Sharp tells me he is more than ever determined to get to Cowes in 86 with us.

Nine ships took part and thirty two sat down to dinner at the Island Sailing Club. Next morning 'Elvera' listened to the early weather forecast predicting strong winds and rain - so feeling rather bad at leaving the others so early made a record passage back to Chichester.

Our programme for 86 follows the pattern of previous years, events which have proved popular, mini cruises in the Solent and the well established annual cruise to the Channel Islands.

A novelty is the proposal to visit the St Katherine's Yacht Haven by Tower Bridge London. 'Elvera' intends to spend the week in the Marina - harbour dues are very much less than hotel bills. If several ships take part we will be able to claim special terms for a club meeting.

On the Tuesday 17 June a pleasure craft river trip is being arranged together with the Lighthouse Club. Leaving Tower Pier 7.30 pm downstream to the Barrier and then upstream as far as we can go to see the lights of London from the river - returning 11.00 pm to Tower Pier. Early application for places advised as numbers will be limited. Dinner, music and wine, deposit £20 per head.
